Dear Readers

Hinxton was stunned to learn of the sudden death of Willy Brown early in August. He was buried on the 22nd at the Barton Glebe Woodland burial ground attended by a considerable assembly of family, friends and professional colleagues. A reception was held afterwards at Darwin College in Cambridge where he had presided as The Master up until 2012.

His influence in the village during the short time he and his wife Jackie had lived here has been significant and unparalleled. With huge relish he took on the unenviable challenge of chairing a Parish Council that was faced with several massive local development threats. In his last summary it was clear that he and his fellow councillors had exhausted all possible arguments and the next stage would be dictated by others beyond our influence.

Tributes to Willy can be read in the following pages and I am hoping we can illustrate his fascinating life and career in a special November edition. Our thoughts are with Jackie and his family.

Losing Willy has left the Parish Council without a leader at a time when the existing membership had already diminished due to changes in personal circumstances.

The village is not lacking in the right people to come forward to help guide us through the next period of undoubted change. Notices have been posted and a letter is printed on page 8 appealing for applicants. To date there has been a very healthy response so hopefully, we can report a full set of councillors in our next edition.

A message from Petro and forgotten, lived and died. This is the story in which we can

An article was published recently in a national newspaper about research in Denmark on the value of culture for mental health and well-being. Participants with significant mental health problems such as anxiety, depression or stress, at levels which prevented them functioning properly, so affecting sleep and eating patterns, their ability to work, relationships, etc., were exposed to cultural activities three or more times a week. This might mean singing in a group, going to a concert, an art gallery or museum, taking part in an art or craft workshop, in order to increase their resilience. In one instance participants were encouraged to snuggle up under blankets in a dimly lit room in an Aalberg library while a librarian read to them for two hours.

Most of us will not have been read to since childhood and so, for some of the participants, this was an emotional experience. Being read to signifies that the reader is attentively giving us time. Story -telling is an inherent part of what it is to be a human being. Even before stories were written down, people would sit, gazing into the firelight and listen to stories, hanging on to every word of the story-teller.

Stories are how we make sense of the world; the interplay between those things we know through experience and those things beyond our own experience or imaginings. We get lost, taken up into stories, so we don't just hear them on a cerebral level, we *experience* them, get caught up in them, identify with the characters or are infuriated with them. We become involved, so our emotions and our own life, experience and memory come into play.

Stories are where we seek out the familiar; those things we can identify with, but which lead to the unfamiliar, the unexperienced. We can understand the behaviour of a heroine, even if we've never been in that situation, because we can imagine. When my son died, thirteen years ago, I reached desperately for Vera Britten's *Testament of Y outh* and Margaret Spufford's *Celebration* in an attempt to *connect* with someone who had experienced and survived the same level of grief, albeit in markedly different circumstances from my own. Here was common ground, a shared journey through a different grief, but oddly comforting. I wasn't alone.

There is, of course, one place where you can be read to on a regular basis - in church. Each day extracts from the Bible are read aloud, as we work through the different books chapter by chapter. It's easy to dismiss the Bible as a book written thousands of years ago with nothing to say to us today and to dismiss those who wrote it as unsophisticated, yet, read, perhaps with guidance, with time, over and again, here we find there is nothing new under the sun and here is some of the most sophisticated thinking. Human beings are the same. The same emotions are felt, the same mistakes are made. Power and wealth still corrupt; there are always the rich and powerful and the poor and powerless. It is frustrating to realise that, despite access to this rich wisdom, we have learned nothing; that we still have the propensity to mess things up big time and yet, it is oddly comforting too, to know that others have been here before, have ploughed the same

furrows before us, have failed, succeeded, loved and lost, learned and forgotten, lived and died. This is the story in which we can find our *story*; where we can seek out our beginnings, our origins. It's a story that doesn't just take us on a linear journey through time, but a journey deep into our selves, where we can take comfort in the familiar aspects of the stories of others and learn from them. It's a lifelong journey of visiting and revisiting even the familiar, so the words can reveal to us the many layers beneath the narrative.

Being in church is one of the few places where adults can experience being read to on a regular basis and I'd like to think it does contribute to our well-being. So, if you're too shy to take your duvet down to the library, do come and join us in church on a Sunday (or weekday) morning. The times are given below.

WILLY BROWN

1945-2019

Willy Brown, chair of Hinxton Parish Council, died unexpectedly at home on the night of Thursday 1st August.

Willy was a friend to many, a person with great intellect and affable style, who brought people and views together, and whose leadership of the Parish Council has been critical in recent times. He was experienced as a Master of Darwin College, Professor of Economics, a chair of many University Committees and not least an ACAS arbitrator, for which he was awarded the CBE. We were so fortunate to benefit from his wisdom and insight which he used so effectively – and that borne so lightly, good naturedly and with good humour.

He brings to mind the quotation from the French Writer and Philosopher Joseph Joubert:

"The aim of argument, or of discussion, should not be victory, but progress."

Though for him I think 'Victory' was the same as Progress as he saw success as when everybody understood each other and found a way forward all could agree on. However, his work as a conciliator did not hold him back from digging in and fighting on our behalf when this was needed. He will be sorely missed in our future planning negotiations.

We are deeply saddened by the sudden loss of someone who had contributed so much to our community.

Our thoughts and heartfelt condolences are with Willy's family.

Professor Brown held the position of Professor of Industrial Relations from 1985 (Emeritus from 2013) at the Faculty of Economics. He was previously Chair of the Faculty of Economics and Head of the School of Humanities and Social Sciences, as well as serving as Master of Darwin College from 2000 – 2012. Before he moved to Cambridge in 1985 he was Director of the Industrial Relations Research Unit at the University of Warwick.

The College is deeply saddened to announce the unexpected death of Professor Willy Brown, much-loved Master of Darwin College 2000-2012, who was an expert in the field of Industrial Relations.

As well as being a former Master of the College, Willy Brown was an Emeritus Fellow of Darwin since 2012 and also an Honorary Fellow of Wolfson College Cambridge, where he had been a Professorial Fellow 1985-2000. He held the Montague Burton Professorship of Industrial Relations in the University for 27 years until his retirement in 2012.


The scheme also now includes reference to the provision of subsidised housing (which our current scheme does not specifically state).

THE HUNDRED PARISHES SOCIETY

Almost every parish within the Hundred Parishes has a church of great antiquity. Each one is different. The most notable external feature is often the tower, erected originally to house a bell or set of bells, raised high so their sound would travel above the surrounding rooftops to summon parishioners to prayer or for a special occasion. Almost all our church towers are square with just two being round: Bardfield Saling and Bartlow.

Some churches have a spire, usually extending upwards from the square tower base and tapering to a point. The combination of tower and spire may be called a steeple. The shapes of spires vary greatly; tall and thin styles are often referred to as

'Hertfordshire spikes' although they are not confined to Hertfordshire. The tallest local steeples are at Saffron Walden (193 feet) and Thaxted (181 feet).

A few churches have a bellcote, where one or two bells hang in a small frame above one end of the roof. Several of these were erected to replace a collapsed bell tower. Wimbish seems to be our only parish church with no tower, spire or bellcote, following the demolition of its tower in 1883.

A few churches have unusual towers or spires including Little Dunmow's separate thin turret, Wareside's octagonal bell tower and High Wych's thin circular spire. The spires of two churches in adjacent parishes, Ickleton and Hinxton, each have a 'sanctus' bell, high up on the outside of the spire - an uncommon design feature.

Next time you are out and about, please keep an eye open for the rich variety of local church architecture.

Do you have apples or pears going to waste each year and ending up in your green bin or on the compost heap?

This year it can be a different story...come along to the Village Hall on October 13th and as well as being able to enjoy a tasty bacon brunch you can bring your 'unwanted' fruit to press.

We will have a mill and press free to use, so that you can turn your apples and pears into delicious juice. Help and guidance will be 'on hand'!

All you need to do is bring your apples and pears, along with bottles in which to take your freshly pressed juice home again.

You will need to make sure any bottle is thoroughly cleaned.

As a rough guide - 2kg of apples will make about 1 litre of juice.

Fresh juice will keep for about 5 days in the fridge or you can freeze it if you use plastic bottles with screw tops.

Dear Friends and Neighbours,

We are writing to ask you to consider joining the Parish Council. The Council is currently severely depleted and we must re-build.

As you may know, Fiona Marshall and Julian Bright resigned for personal/professional reasons some months ago. Coupled with Willy Brown's untimely recent death, this has left us with just 4 members (out of 7 total). Two of the remaining members will step down in the not distant future (Graham Fagg as a result of re-location; and Steve Trudgill following dedicated and long-standing service).

Dick Jones has kindly stated his willingness – in the absence of other candidates – to take the role of Chair until the end of this year. Dick intends to remain on the Parish Council thereafter, but will likely spend more time in the USA. Nicholas Cliffe will also remain a councillor but due to work commitments is unable to take on the chairmanship.

We are fortunate that Rupert Kirby has agreed to join the Council. Rupert brings valuable experience in the property sector and has contributed significantly to our response to the SmithsonHill Agritech proposal in particular.

This leaves us with a need to recruit up to 4 new members and to identify a longer-term chairperson between now and the end of the year.

Willy always used to say that if members of the Parish would be willing to spend just a couple of years on the Parish Council, we could create a strong and sustainable team. We have an amazing range of skills and experience in the village, and if we can bring some of that to bear on a 2-3 year rotating basis, we would be well positioned to manage routine village affairs and to mount a strong and robust defence in the event of challenges.

We very much need your help. Please consider joining us on the Parish Council. We need new members that reflect the diversity of the village. If you would like to find out more, feel free to contact any of us.

And if others can offer occasional advice or support to the Parish Council in specific areas of expertise, that would additionally be very helpful. Again, do please get in touch.




