

Hinxton and Duxford and the church building was


The process for finding a new vicar to serve in the churches here is quite a slow one – in fact it's very unlikely that we would be able to appoint someone before the end of the summer.

The logo of the Hundred Parishes Society includes birds and trees surrounding a church spire. This tranquil scene, a wood engraving by Eric Ravilious, captures the sights and sounds of the countryside, hinting at church bells, wind in the treetops and bird song.

During a wintry walk as you scan the horizon you may spy a variety of birds. Mixed flocks of noisy corvids, especially rooks and jackdaws, deftly execute their aerial acrobatics in blustery conditions. The larger ravens are increasing in number and you may hear their gurgling croaks which carry far on the wind.

Mature circle-soaring buzzards are patrolling their territories. Hovering kestrels are searching for food. You may also see a red kite with a forked tail and wingspan of nearly 6 feet (1.8 metres).

As a tractor cuts furrows in the damp ground, the corvids are frequently joined by noisy groups of gulls eager to feast on worms and other soil invertebrates. Farmers do what they can to discourage unwelcome flocks of vegetarian woodpigeons as they attack their precious crops.

Mixed parties of tits keep in touch as they flit among branches searching for insect food. Robins sing and a mistle thrush may proclaim his presence from a lofty perch. In a sunny sheltered spot, starlings

whistle merrily.

As you walk, a snap of a twig or the squelch of your boot in the wet mud reveals your presence and a startled pheasant or blackbird may sound an urgent alarm call.

All too often, the background noise of vehicles, sirens and aircraft can intrude, but it is still possible to find locations where the natural sounds take centre stage. I encourage you to experience the sights and sounds of the countryside. www.hundredparishes.org.uk offers a choice of winter walks.



Commentary from the Parish Council Meeting, 13 January 2020

The Parish Council Team.

The Parish Council was delighted to welcome Emma Senior as a new member. The Parish Council has substantially replenished over the last few months. There will be a couple more vacancies on the Council coming up, and we're grateful for the interest to date in filling these. If other residents are interested in joining the Parish Council, please contact the Clerk (hinxtonpc@gmail.com). It's a great team and a very worthwhile activity!

Wellcome Genome Campus (WGC) Expansion.

The Parish Council has sent a letter to the Secretary of State requesting that the WGC application is called in for review. It has also emailed our local MP requesting his support. Other Parish Councils have supported this action.

Mitigations for the village via a S106 agreement – in the event that the proposal is approved by the Secretary of State – are under discussion via SCDC. We understand that SCDC received an updated S106 proposal from Wellcome prior to Christmas, and that this is under review. We have been assured by SCDC that this will not be concluded without an agreement of terms between Wellcome and Hinxton Parish Council.

In December, BBC Radio Cambridge ran a piece including the interview of the Chair of the Parish Council and Councillors Peter McDonald and Peter Topping, that highlighted local opposition to WGC expansion at the scale proposed. Hinxton Parish Council considers that SCDC have stretched the national significance argument beyond the bounds of reasonableness, in particular in regard to its approval of 1500 housing units, a hotel and the extent of commercial business park development.

SmithsonHill AgriTech Park.

The Secretary of State has notified interested parties that the determination of this case has been deferred until March 2020 to take into account new information resulting in particular from the approval of the WGC expansion by SCDC. The Parish Council will write to the Secretary of State confirming its opposition to the Agritech Park.

North Uttlesford Garden Community (NUGC).

At the time of the Parish Council meeting, the NUGC proposal awaited the outcome of the Planning Inspector's review of Uttlesford's Local Plan. Following the meeting,

we learned that the Inspector had found the Local Plan to be unsound and the proposal to establish NUGC to be non -viable and inappropriately located based on a range of issues including harm to landscape and heritage assets.

WGC and Playground.

The Parish Council reiterated its thanks to Wellcome for replacing the iron bridge, and for its commitment to contribute £1,000 to the replacement of the wooden train in the playground. Thanks were also expressed to the Parish Clerk for securing a Community Chest Grant contributing to the wooden train. The Clerk will explore covering the remaining costs for the train and the repair of the playground flint wall via a grant from Amey Cespa.

Street Lighting.

It was noted that the old concrete lamppost in Mill Lane has been de-commissioned as a result of safety issues and non-functionality over several years.

Website.

The Parish Council expressed its thanks to Brad Charteris for management of the Parish Council website, and expressed its support to build out community information and related news.

Councillor Peter Topping.

The Parish Council was sad to learn that Peter Topping is stepping down as our local County Councillor, as a result of relocation. Peter had been a strong supporter of Hinxton and other local parishes, including most recently in regard to the proposal by Wellcome to expand WGC. The Parish Council expressed its thanks to Peter and wished him and his family every happiness for the future.

The first weeks in Parliament have been extremely busy as new MPs have been inducted into the often arcane procedures of the House of Commons. I have been busy setting up my offices in both Westminster and the constituency. I have hosted my first surgery, and will hold them on a regular basis around the constituency.

If you would like to speak to me about issues of concern, please email me at the address below. Locally there are many challenges - and opportunities. The City and District Councils have published a consultation on the joint Greater Cambridge Local Plan, covering housing, jobs and infrastructure development in our area for the next 20 years. Many local residents are worried about the rapid pace of development in South Cambridgeshire, so I am concerned that the new plan contemplates a 61% increase in housebuilding in our area. This would equate to 66,700 new homes between 2017 and **2040**. The joint consultation also suggests large scale developments on green belt land. It is crucial that our area does not fall victim to overdevelopment, and I will be fighting for more sustainable development. If you want to see further information on the new Local Plan consultation

visit <u>www.greatercambridgeplanning.org</u>. This month, Network Rail will start a consultation on the locations for a new **Cambridge South**



Station for Addenbrooke's and the Biomedical Campus. I am a big supporter of this project and there is widespread local backing, so I will continue to push for it at the Department of Transport and the Treasury. The consultation will start with a series of public events from 20th – 30th January. For more details about the consultation visit www.networkrail.co.uk/cambridge-south-station

Our transport system needs major improvements to get South Cambridgeshire moving again. I continue to push for the Department of Transport commitment to build the East West Rail (EWR) line with a station in Cambourne. I have written to

the Transport Secretary, Grant Shapps, making the case for the northern route for EWR. In the coming weeks, I will be meeting with local NHS service providers, businesses, schools, environmental groups and farmers in to talk about the issues they face.
