There will also be an exciting series of talks and presentations at Whittlesford Church, with refreshments available from 7pm. 

Anthony Browne MP

As I write, it has been just over nine weeks since the general election, although it feels like a lifetime ago. So much has happened in the early days of this Parliament both nationally and locally.

The UK has officially left the European Union and must now focus on negotiating a new trading relationship with our European partners. For South Cambridgeshire, a crucial aspect of this new arrangement will be the provisions on agriculture. I was therefore delighted to make farming issues the focus of my maiden speech to Parliament during the debate on the government's new Agriculture Bill. In the coming weeks and months I want to engage closely with local farmers to better understand their needs, so that I can best represent their views in Parliament as it shapes the country's future agriculture policy. If you would like to be involved in these discussions, please get in touch.

You may have heard that the Secretary of State for Housing, Communities and Local Government has recently elected not to 'call-in' the planning application for the expansion of the Genome Campus at Hinxton, following the decision of South Cambs District Council to grant outline permission for the scheme in October last year. This means that the final planning decision will now be taken by South Cambs District Council. I know that this news has come as a disappointment to many local residents who are very concerned about the scope of this development and were hopeful that the Secretary of State might scale back the plans. I have met with the Secretary of State to explain the concerns of local people and have written to him to ask for further information regarding the rationale behind his decision. I am also liaising with the Hinxton Parish Council and will continue to do so.

Last week I enjoyed a fascinating visit to the new Royal Papworth. It is the first UK hospital to be rated outstanding across every CQC category, which is a testament to the talent and commitment of its staff and management team. I saw the site where the Cambridge Heart & Lung Research Institute (HLRI) will be built, a brilliant example of the how the Biomedical Campus brings together the world's best clinicians and researchers to develop new treatments for the most challenging conditions. We are so fortunate that this local expertise will improve healthcare not only here in South Cambs, but across the world. I know there are concerns about the UK's ability to collaborate with EU research partners post-Brexit and I therefore raised this matter in Parliament with the Science Minister in January. He offered

assurances that the UK would remain committed to the Horizon 2020 programme and would seek as full an association as possible with its successor scheme, but I will continue to meet with local stakeholders and push the government on this issue.

One of my key pledges as your MP is to help to fix our creaking transport system. We had some extremely welcome news this month when the Transport Secretary announced that East West Rail will take a northern route through Cambourne, where local commuter demand is highest. This is not only great news for Cambourne, but also for residents in the Bassingbourn area, who were overwhelmingly opposed to EWR taking a southern route.

The new Cambridge South Station will form a critical new transport hub for the Cambridge Biomedical Campus. I have already met with Network Rail to find out more about this project and to discuss parking problems at local stations and the notoriously problematic level crossing at Foxton.

I am actively raising local issues in Parliament. For updates on my questions and speeches, the best place to look is my Facebook page (@anthonybrownemp) or website (anthonybrowne.org). "I am immensely grateful to have had the opportunity to serve my patients for the best part of twenty years. I have enjoyed the privilege of their trust, built through respect, dedication, and stability."

I am fortunate to continue offering my time, experience and knowledge to patients in the prison service. I will also continue to practice in my areas of clinical specialist skill and interest: enhanced minor surgery, vasectomy services, sports medicals and dermatology."

It is easy to take for granted the helpful signposts to be found at many of our road junctions, yet they are part of our culture and heritage. Early road signs were erected by cycling and then motoring organisations as ordinary people began to enjoy the freedom afforded by ownership of a bicycle or motor car. Standards for signage on main roads were redefined in the 1960s to satisfy faster traffic and night visibility. Fingerposts that indicate direction and distance from rural junctions are frequently much older and can merit further investigation.

Fingerposts, with arms pointing in several directions, are white with black lettering, and generally made of wood or iron. Many local examples, some almost 100 years old, were made of iron in Essex at Maldon Iron Works. The manufacturer's name is now usually obscured by many layers of paint.

Personal favourites include the fingerpost at Matching Green indicating the mileage to London –precisely 26¼ - and one north of High Roding that points to Takeley Station which closed 60 years ago. On the B1039 between Chrishall and Great

Chishill, a finger points to a non-existent GREAT CHISHALL. A Henham sign shows the way to the pub, Ugley Chequers. This and all other signposts were removed for the duration of WWII lest they should aid the enemy.

Some signs at T-junctions have information on the back, albeit hidden from view. Usually this is the same as the visible side, but not always: the southerly finger of one on the B1051 in Broxton points to Broxton and Bps Stortford, but the back reveals that it has been recycled and once pointed to Wimbish Green.


Beavers, Cubs and Scouts
