

Tell us about your early life in Hinxton

My parents were Nellie and Ted Tofts and I was their only child. I was born at number 10 High St, it is now number 79. I remember how I loved staring out of my bedroom window across to the farm and watching the farm hands building the stacks, with their trouser bottoms tied up in case any rats or mice were on the loose. We had lovely neighbours and one of them, Mrs Lidmore, used to give me a farthing to do her shopping. I still have 5 of the coins at home. Growing up in Hinxton was such fun. No one was a stranger and we children were free to play on the roads and paths. We enjoyed the popular games of the day such as skipping, jinks (jacks), hopscotch and tracking and we played on the carts in the cart shed. In Summer we played in the ford or at the mill, enjoying the cool water. In those days it seemed that every day was sunny. At Christmas time the British Legion held a party for all the children of the village in the Reading Room. Sandwiches, jelly and buns were enjoyed by all. Each child brought their own plate, cup and spoon. Plates were clearly marked with the owner's name and brightly coloured wool was wound around

the spoons and the handles of the cups. Christmas had a present for every child so we all went home happy. I loved my time at Hinxton School and my favourite teacher was Mrs Walker. Two memories stand out. The first involved standing around the fire in Winter as we tried to defrost our frozen bottles of milk. The second was when we would visit Lordship Farm to watch the sheep having their annual dip. In those days the sheep and cattle would be herded through the village and we children would help by filling the gaps and gateways to prevent the animals going astray. When I left school I went to work in the Ciba glue factory and was there for 8 years. In 1968 I married Gerald, Iris's brother. We have two daughters Victoria and Samantha and three lovely grandsons complete the family. We are the only

daughters Victoria and Samantha and three lovely grandsons complete the family. We are the only married couple in Hinxton to have both been born in the village and together we have lived here for 146 years!

What was your earliest memory of living in Hinxton?

Being pushed in my father's wheelbarrow up Hunts Lane to the allotment on Top Rd. In Spring we would keep an eye open for nesting birds. We would watch at a distance and my father would help me to identify them.

What do you like to do in your leisure time?
Gerald and I both love gardening. I read a lot, do cross stitch and enjoy making Lego models helped by my grandsons. My favourites are of the Taj Mahal and Tower Bridge.

Spending time with my family is the thing that gives me most pleasure.



Do you have a favourite flower in the garden?

I have 3 favourites - salvias, penstemons and gaura. They are all very long flowering and each is beautiful in its own way.

If you could have one gift what would it be? To make the world a more peaceful place.

Do you have a favourite piece of music? Or film?

I enjoy most popular music. The first thing I do in the morning is to turn on Radio 2. 60s music is the best in my opinion. I was very lucky to be able to go to the New Musical Express Shows in 1964 and 1965 and saw the Beatles, Cilla Black, the Animals, Dusty Springfield and the Rolling Stones performing live. The films that I've watched most are Dirty Dancing and Pretty Woman.

What historical figure do you most admire and why?

Aneurin Bevan for being instrumental in founding the NHS. Gerald and I cannot speak highly enough of the

care we have received, particularly over the last 2 years. We just wish that there wasn't such a funding crisis and that staff were better paid.

Who would be your ideal dinner guests?

Peter Kay the comedian, Mrs Brown, Gordon Buchanan, the wildlife photographer, Adele and Princess Diana for her glamour and grace. The food would be most important and I would choose James Martin to do the cooking.

Do you like holidays? Where are your favourite places? If you could choose to go anywhere in

the world tomorrow where would it be?

My favourite country to visit is Scotland, particularly the Western Highlands. Gerald and I have been on several very enjoyable coach tours there. My as yet unfulfilled dream is to go to Africa to see the Big 5.

Anything else you would like to share with us?

One night I was out with my friend Trisha. I was on my bike. Thinking that the local bobby had already been on his nightly visit to the village, I gave Trisha a ride down the hill. Unfortunately coming up the road towards us was the policeman. He promptly stopped me, gave me a warning about

riding two on a bike and wrote my name and address down in his notebook. I was much too frightened to tell Mum and Dad, but thankfully they never found out..

Holidays often bring with them the opportunity to visit a variety of different churches. Many people visit because of a historical interest; some visit for a few moments of peace and quiet to take a break from sight-seeing, and others maybe for spiritual refreshment. Our own church in Hinxton has a visitors' book and lits always interesting to see where visitors come from; sometimes from nearby and often much further afield.

Having just had an amazing holiday in the Holy Land I did of course visit quite a number of churches, many of which lay claim to be sited over particular places where specific events in Jesus' life and ministry took place. For me the most moving of these was the Church of the Annunciation in Nazareth and it was extraordinary to stand in what is highly likely to have been Mary's home and the very place where the angel Gabriel visited and told her that she was going to be the means by which God's own Son would come into our world. The sense of awe and wonder was almost tangible (and I'm not normally one to be moved by buildings).

As for church services, we attended two – both very different from here. The one in Nazareth was a similar form of service but conducted half in Arabic and half in English which kept us on our toes!. The other was Vespers at an Armenian Greek Orthodox church. I had never been in such a church before and it seemed very strange that all the congregation stood around the walls of the church for the entire service while the priest and various other 'officiants' moved around near the front in their long black cloaks and black hoods while there were long readings and some chanted singing. After the service I asked the 'priest in charge' if they have young people in the church. His response was positive and when I asked how it is that they can keep the youngsters coming his response was simple: 'teach them the roots, go back to the roots'. And I guess that's what we all need to do.

Cambridgeshire Constabulary - Police Unity Tour 2017

Each member of the Cambridgeshire team will be riding in memory of a specific officer from Cambridgeshire Constabulary who has lost their life on duty, wearing a wrist band with the fallen officer's name. The route will be around 120 miles.

In the run up to the event, those undertaking the tour are raising money for COPS. This is a UK charity that aims to help the families of police officers who have lost their lives whilst on duty. They also aim to ensure that all survivors have the help they need to rebuild their lives and remain part of the police family.

Hinxton Parish Council 8 May 2017

SmithsonHill AgriPark

I will be attending the exhibition by SmithsonHill on 16 and 17 May. From what we have heard in the past, this is likely to be for an Agritech Park of about 3,000 to 4,000 jobs. Transport, highways issues and effect on the landscape are likely to be significant factors to discuss when a formal planning application comes forward, probably later this year.

Further comment may be necessary after we have seen the exhibition.

North Uttlesford Garden Village Great Chesterford)

This is another issue that we must take seriously. Uttlesford District Council is in the early stages of developing its Local Plan, as it has had to re-start the process.

The extent of new development likely to be included in the Plan may mean that the Plan needs to identify two sites for significant new housing. Six new settlement locations are being tested against various criteria – the sites are at or near Great Chesterford, Elsenham, Great Dunmow, Braintree, Little Dunmow and Takeley.

There is a promoter presentation of the North Uttlesford Garden Village proposals at the Uttlesford District Council Civic Offices, London Road, Saffron Walden on Wednesday 24 May – meeting starts at 7.00 pm

Moto Service Station

I understand that Moto has been involved in pre-application discussions with South Cambridgeshire District Council about a motorway service area on the east side of the M11 at Duxford.

Traffic coming off and later getting back onto the M11 at this point can only, in my view, make the peak-time congestion in this area much worse.

I understand that the Imperial War Museum (Duxford) is very concerned about such a proposal as it could have a severe impact on flying.

Sawston Trade Park

I attended an exhibition on 20 April about proposals to redevelop the Sawston Trade Park.

The Trade Park lies between the Sawston By-pass and London Road, Pampisford, and is actually in Pampisford. Seen from the Sawston by-pass you will be aware of a number of trees having been cut down recently which had opened out much of the western side of the site.

The site is occupied by Iconix and a number of large retail units. The redevelopment as set out in the exhibition leaves the Iconix part of the site virtually unchanged but a change of focus for the rest of the site by moving from retail to more office,


research and development, and laboratory-based accommodation.

A new access would be created off the Sawston by-pass, and a figure of 1000 jobs on the site was mentioned. Traffic issues would obviously be significant here and there was a suggestion about making some improvements at the MacDonald's roundabout.

A planning application may be submitted later this year. In summary, some or all of these proposals may in due course come forward as planning applications and none, some or all may be approved in some form. Traffic and transport issues are relevant in each case.

However, whilst these proposals may come forward quite separately, I am concerned about the already present congested state of the A505, particularly on all four arms of the MacDonald's roundabout and the effect any of these proposals might have. Taken cumulatively the impact would be immense.

Merrell's Crochet Creations

I never cease to be surprised at what you can create with crochet. There are so many different patterns and ways of crocheting to create the most marvellous creations.

I was inspired by some knitted flowers my Mum has in her kitchen and I set about looking at how to recreate them. I couldn't get the hang of knitting so I tried crochet instead.

I have only been crocheting for three years and I learnt a lot from YouTube channels and beginners' books. Since learning to crochet back in 2014 I have crocheted many things but I mainly enjoy crocheting flowers the most. My favourite will always be the simple daisy flowers inspired by the knitted ones of my Mum's but I have mastered pansies, daffodils, African violets and roses to name a few.

It took me a long time to get techniques right, to get the right kind of wool for my little projects and to get my creations to stay looking perfect after I had finished. The discovery of fixative and hot glue didn't come for quite a while so many of my family and friends have been subjected to woolly flowers for

Christmas and birthday gifts and found that after a little while later the wool began to curl and the wire started to expose itself!

Along with discovering ways to make my flowers last longer I strive for ideas for new patterns. It's always been trial and error but I think that can be said for any form of art.

There are many patterns out there to try but sometimes what you want isn't easily found so I began to create my own patterns or adjust something I read in a book to get my creations looking how I want them. Since having moved to Hinxton and having a real garden of my own I have begun to really appreciate and pay more attention to the shapes of flowers and the different types which come out throughout the year; producing so many

different colours. This has really helped me develop my crochet skills as I really want to gain more of a sense of reality for my woolly flowers.



ROSEMARY'S RAMBLINGS

Midsummer and the July garden is full of colour, while there is some maintenance to be done this is the month to relax and enjoy not only the richness of the borders but also the delicious scents of summer.

A few jobs that the garden will thank you for, keep feeding and deadheading bedding plants, if some are looking straggly cut back quite hard as this will encourage them to try harder. Keep all new plantings well-watered, a thorough dousing twice a week is much better than a little every day. Always water in the evenings if possible.

Remove rose blooms as soon as they fade, cutting back to well below the old bloom to include at least 3 eyes or buds, this will encourage rapid regrowth of new flowering wood. Pruning of shrubs that flowered in June will mean more flowers next year, cut flowered wood back to a new shoot and remove some of the oldest wood right down to the ground. Always feed a general fertiliser after these jobs.

The lawn should be mowed with the blades raised a little in hot weather. Never worry if brown patches appear, as soon as the rain arrives it will soon green up.

Snip the tops off climbing beans when they reach the top of their supports to maximise cropping on the side shoots. If you are growing cordon tomatoes they will also need stopping, cut off the main shoot above the main truss of developing fruit, that way all the fruit should ripen before the end of the season. Shallots and garlic need to be ripened in the sun for good flavour and longer storage time. Do save a few bulbs for replanting this autumn.

If you are planning a holiday this summer don't forget the needs of your garden, if you have no one to water your containers cluster them together in a shady spot that is open to rain and feed and water thoroughly just before leaving. Take down hanging baskets and sit them directly into a depression in the soil surface in a cool spot, drench with water so that the soil underneath is also wet. Remove the flowers from all plants in containers for a fresh display on your return.

It is time for sitting in the shade, for meals taken out doors, for impromptu parties or simply absorbing the peace and stillness of the garden at the end of a busy day.



So many villages struggle to maintain their treasured church but so far we are managing to do it - thanks to you all. It's a huge ongoing cost with endless trials and tribulations of planning and approvals most of us would cringe from, but the treasure is worth it.

St Mary and St John Church. Take a look at the guide books. Or take another look around the church yourself and perhaps consider becoming a Member.

"It is a medieval flint and rubble church in the early-English style. It consists of a chancel, nave, south aisle, south chapel, south porch and a western tower with lead-covered spire that contains a clock and two bells. The bells were made in 1662 and re-hung in 1903; the clock dates from 1700, was renovated in 1809 and, after several years of inactivity, was coaxed back into action in the early 1990s! The chancel and nave date to around 1200, while to south aisle and chapel are 14th Century, the latter being built by bequest of Thomas Skelton whose memorial is in the church. Other parts of the grade II* listed building are between 15th and 19th Century."

Your funds and support go towards repair and improvement of the church building and upkeep of the churchyard. You have recently helped to re-lead an area of roof and to update the security system, update the lighting and fit a sound system. Now funds will go to repair the organ. The Parish continues to oversee these improvements and make the most of all the help given by The Friends.
