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

## Bricks and mortar

Over the past year, as I've visited Duxford Primary School, it's been very interesting to see the building work progress. I was even able to watch from my garden as the steel frames were put in and the roofline began to fill out.

This week, as I write in early August, some of the final work is taking place - not building, now, but dismantling. When I cycled past the playground on Monday, the temporary classrooms and sometime home of the DX Club and Duxford Preschool were being taken apart. Today - almost exactly 3 years since the school was engulfed in flames - they had gone for good.

A newspaper article from August 2019 quoted Suzanne, the head teacher, as she tried to face the future:

*"Together we will make sure we get back to having a place that is more than just bricks and mortar, but somewhere that offers children a place to develop and grow – somewhere they will continue to love".*

These were brave words, containing a beautiful vision for the life of the school that was to be tested severely, not just with the challenge of the building, but also

during COVID times, where children and families and schools were hard hit in so many ways.

On **10 September**, near the start of the new term, there will be an open day at school, where everyone is invited to come and see the new classrooms and other spaces. And at 10am, at the start of the open day there'll be a short service: a chance to reflect on this new beginning and its new opportunities, a chance to ask for God's blessing on the building and the school as it begins another phase in its life in the village.

Please come and join us, to celebrate and look forward together.



# The Genome Campus next steps

The developer's planning application to construct "two bridges and all associated structures, ramped walkways, stairs, lifts, boundary wall, footway and cycle paths, lighting, utilities, construction access, construction compound, hard and soft landscaping works, planting, tree removal, earthworks, drainage infrastructure, surface water drainage features and all necessary enabling works and demolitions" was considered by South Cambridgeshire District Council Planning Committee on 09 August 2023.

The Chairman of Hinxtton Parish Council attended the meeting (together with two other parish councillors) and made representation on behalf of the parish council against approval with particular reference to the building of two bridges across the A1301, one being relatively close to the village, as opposed to one central bridge. However, despite support for this point of view from the local district councillor, the planning committee approved the plans as submitted

**1. COFFEE CANTATA by J. S. Bach** Unlikely I'd get a shot of my favourite caffeine every morning on most desert islands, so next best thing would be Sumi Jo or Emma Kirkby singing this to wake me up. Also, the plot is SO funny considering the composer and it was written in the 1730s. A father is trying to force his daughter into marriage, but she would rather have three cups of coffee instead.

**2. AIN'T GOT NO/I GOT LIFE by Nina Simone** I really admire her uncompromising and challenging music, often tumultuous listening. I was lucky to hear her sing it at the London Palladium for my 17<sup>th</sup> birthday treat. The lyrics only too poignant today for those with no country, education, food or clean water or - but still have life and hope.

**3. DREAMS by Fleetwood Mac** Never been able to resist dancing to this one, even if I do embarrass my nearest and dearest by lapsing into teenage hippy mode.

**4. I GET AROUND by The Beach Boys** Because you can dance around to this too, and I certainly got around to meeting a lot of amazing people (not often the most famous types) and experienced inspiring places and events working in the newspaper and magazine industry over nearly five decades. And because we all sang along in the car on family holidays.

**5. MANHATTAN by Ella Fitzgerald** The whole family just loves everything about her, she has been there every step of the way with style and swing, from driving our daughters around as infants to get them asleep to major festive occasions or just cooking together.

**6. MINOR SWING by Django Reinhardt and Stephane Grappelli** Originally recorded with the Quintette du Hot Club of France back in the 1930s, these amazing jazz instrumentalists developed their own lyrical and jubilant style. Reinhardt was 18 when his left hand was maimed in a caravan fire, he fought back and devised his own methods for chord progressions, which he was probably the first to perform on the guitar.

**7. IS A DREAM/I HOLD ONLY YOU by Richard Strauss** The final trio from Der Rosenkavalier sung by Kiri Te Kanawa, Anne Sofie von Otter and Barbara Hendricks, because I love opera and this is about love and its joy and sadness. I remember the first time I heard it on a car radio, while trying to find a parking space in a dingy underground carpark. I turned off the engine as the sublime voices engulfed me.

**8. FLAMENCO SKETCHES (ALTERNATIVE TAKE) by Miles Davis** This comes on the iconic Kind of Blue album that rocked jazz. The title owes its name to the flamenco scale rather than the dance. The alternative take is slower than earlier recordings and was added in the 1990s. As the sleeve notes say: if you want a trip to heaven, might as well go first class!!

# The Hundred Parishes Society



Residents living in the countryside of the Hundred Parishes are fortunate that the intrusive sounds of human activities are less when compared to those living within built up areas close to main roads or railway tracks or beneath regular flight paths. Even within our homes our ears are subjected to a cacophony of sounds: TV or radio programmes, ring tones, the hum of machines, barking dogs or noisy neighbours. Rarely are we surrounded by silence!

Appreciating tranquillity is an essential aspect of being in the countryside, where it should be possible to scan attractive views of verdant landscapes or cloudy skiescapes, hear natural sounds and catch glimpses of wildlife without intrusive background noises. Evidence gathered over the past 15 years reveals that tranquillity is not just a pleasurable experience but is essential for human health and wellbeing reducing stress levels and lifting spirits.

In the early 1990's concerns were raised about the harmful levels of intrusive noise in daily lives. The Countryside Commission and the Council for the

Protection of Rural England worked together to produce an Intrusion Map which highlighted areas that were most affected by human-induced noises. Since then, research has been undertaken by CPRE and others to develop suitable methodology for measuring noise and evaluate the visual impact of developments on landscapes.

In 2012, tranquillity gained recognition in national planning policy. Now studies are prepared to evaluate Landscape Character Areas and their Sensitivity to Change, and these are included in the reports prepared for Local Plans. They must include appropriate mitigation measures to help reduce intrusive noise to acceptable levels.

The walk descriptions listed on the Hundred Parishes website provide opportunities to appreciate the tranquillity of this part of the country, to hear bird song, sense the wind in the trees and view some wonderful rural landscapes.

7:30pm for 7:45pm start.**


The menu is primarily inspired by our sous chef Liam. It is posted on the website and the limited places are going fast.

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

# Linda's Amazing Cook Book



I like Seasalt clothing, and they often send me brochures in the post. In the last one, I was surprised to find this interesting looking cake recipe. Our rhubarb was cropping well, so I picked a bunch, made the cake- and everyone liked it. I've made it several times now and it is pretty foolproof. It's also good if you have any family or friends who eat gluten free as it's made without wheat flour.

## Rhubarb & Orange Polenta Cake

### Ingredients

- 150g soya margarine
- 200g caster sugar
- 3 eggs
- Finely grated zest and juice of 1 large orange
- 150g polenta
- 2 tsp baking powder
- 75g ground almonds
- 400g chopped rhubarb
- 1 tbsp sugar

### Method

1. Preheat the oven to 170°C, grease and line the base of your cake tin.
2. Cream the butter, sugar and orange zest until pale and fluffy.
3. Beat in the eggs.
4. Fold in the polenta, baking powder and ground almonds.
5. Spoon half the mixture over the base of the tin.
6. Arrange the chopped rhubarb over the cake base and spoon the rest of the mixture over the top.
7. Bake at 170°C for 1 hour.
8. When baked, warm the juice of the orange and stir in 1tbsp sugar
9. Drizzle the mixture over your cake.
10. Decorate with flaked almonds and edible flowers if you have them.
