Where did you grow up? Tell me about your early life We both grew up in the East end of London and had very happy childhoods.

What things give you great pleasure?


Lots of things! Being together is great and spending time with friends and family.



<u>The Development Proposals of</u> <u>Smithson Hill</u>

There is no shortage of developers eager to change the countryside around us. Hinxton villagers may recall that Smithson Hill held an exhibition back in the summer. They will be making another presentation on where their plans have got to and answering questions in the village hall on the evening of Thursday 19 January. It may help the discussion to sum up where it was left.



Smithson Hill is a joint venture between Russell Smith Farms, a major landowner around here, and Hill Commercial Investments, a private development company based in Waltham Abbey. Many of the reports relating to the promotion are addressed to Hinxton Land Limited, which was the previous name of Smithson Hill Limited. Of a number of consultancies involved in the proposal, the lead firm is Terence O'Rourke, a nationial practice currently locally involved in the developments at Trumpington and Northstowe. In 2014 they made representations to South Cambridgeshire District Council on behalf of Smithson Hill for the proposed development.

The land in question is the area around Hinxton Grange coloured yellow on the map, arable land between the

A1301 and the A11. In 2008 this area had been proposed and, after a robust campaign, rejected, as an eco-town called Hanley Grange. The Cambridge green belt ends just the other side of the A505. When they first approached the Parish Council in 2015 the proposal was for the use of the land for crop trials and with a small cluster of buildings for associated testing and equipment.

When they made their presentation in July 2016, the proposal (to be found at

www.smithsonhill.co.ukpublic_exhibition_1/)

was for a hub to facilitate the 'agritech' sector, with approximately 100,000 sqm of lettable commercial floorspace for incubator units, grow-on space, laboratory and office accommodation. Associated with it would be a parkland setting, land for crop trials and demonstrations. There would also be a transport hub, on land they own between Whittlesford Parkway railway station and the roundabout where the A1301 crosses the A505. Much of their exhibition, and another presentation at Sawston, had been concerned with enquiring about deficiencies in local transport provision. Their web-site said that 'residential development is not part of the current thinking'.

Our District Councillor, Tony Orgee, commented in the August Hinxton News that, on the normal formula of 30 sqm per employee, the 100,000 sqm would be capable of accommodating somewhere in the region of 3000 to 4000 employees. He noted that the site is not allocated for development in the adopted Local Development Framework and is not included in the emerging South Cambridgeshire Local Plan. The proposal is not formally before the inspector conducting the public examination into the draft South Cambs Local Plan. The inspector did not request additional work on this issue in her most recent May 2015 letter. This is just one of a number of emerging strategic scale developments being promoted in the Cambridge and Greater Cambridge area which would need to be assessed through the local planning process. The Local Plan is expected to be adopted in late 2017 and to be jointly agreed by both the District Council and City Council. At present the Smithson Hill Agritech proposal therefore has no planning status.

Your Parish Council will continue to monitor the situation. If any Hinxton News readers have or come across additional information of interest, their input would be welcome.

Hinkledux has an exciting event to report this month – but maybe before getting into that it would be good to focus for a few moments on the worldwide church, particularly as at the end of the month it will be the **Week of Prayer for Christian Unity.**

Typing 'Persecution of Christians' into Google, one comment jumped out at me: *The lack of public outcry over the persecution of Christians is a huge scandal*, and on further investigation one can read of Christians being persecuted in many parts of the world – and of course at the moment it is the Middle East and Nigeria that gets the widest news coverage.

One reputable organisation which exists to support Christians undergoing persecution states that worldwide 322 Christians are killed for their faith every month, 214 churches and Christian properties are destroyed and 722 acts of violence are committed against Christians every month. Extraordinary figures and one would prefer to turn the page for some lighter reading.

All of the above should make us doubly thankful for the freedom to worship that we have in this country – and also for the responsibility that Christians here have to pray for their brothers and sisters who are suffering elsewhere.

And now to the good news: for those who have not already heard, an appointment has been made to fill our incumbent vacancy. **Rev Petra Shakeshaft** who is currently curate at St John's, Hills Road will be coming to serve here; we don't know exactly when that will be, but expect that it will be at Easter at the earliest.

Some years ago Petra came to our parishes for a short period during her training for ordination and worked under Jessica. She made a very positive impression at the time and she comes to us with very strong recommendation from her various referees and from the Bishop himself. In addition having seen for herself the situation in our three parishes she was eager to apply for the post

However, until Petra comes our retired clergy, our Readers and churchwardens will do our best to keep the ship afloat and moving forward.

The Hundred Parishes Society

This is a great time of year to walk off the Christmas excesses and enjoy our unique part of the country. With crisp, bright days, we can all enjoy the countryside in its winter clothes.

One essential I would recommend is an Ordnance Survey map, ideally the orange Explorer map which has a scale of 1 to 25,000 and shows many detailed features including footpaths and field boundaries. They can be purchased from good stationers or online from <u>www.ordnancesurvey.co.uk/leisure</u>.

Investment in a good pair of walking boots, probably for less than £100, will be paid back over many years and hundreds of miles, especially if you look after them.


Our area has an extensive network of generally well-maintained public rights of way – footpaths for walkers and bridleways that may also be used by horse riders and cyclists. Do try out new routes, planning before you set off. Bear in mind that a path that runs beside a field edge is less likely to get muddy than one that crosses a field.

Plan your route so that the sun follows you. This is good practice at any time of the year, but especially so in winter with the low sun. For a lengthy, circular walk, try to start near the southeast corner and head clockwise. The sun will follow you, keeping the glare from your eyes and giving you the best views. Most of the walks on the Hundred Parishes website follow this principle.


Do check that your intended lunch stop will be open – phone numbers appear in the parish introductions on <u>www.hundredparishes.org.uk</u>.

Finally, be sure to wrap up warm with double-thickness woolly hat and gloves, a scarf and layers of clothing . . . and enjoy !

PLEASE PUT THIS IN YOUR DIARY.



I can't believe the end of the year is approaching already, so before I forget, may I wish all readers a very Merry Christmas and prosperous New Year? I was delighted to welcome the Prime Minister to Hinxton in November for her visit to the Sanger Institute Wellcome Genome Campus. Theresa was impressed by the world-leading research taking place and took the opportunity to announce the launch of a £2bn fund intended to keep Britain at the forefront of research and development in science and technology. I was so proud to be showing off our constituency! You'll have seen from the Autumn Statement that South Cambs is now part of a 'growth corridor' from Cambridgeshire to Oxford. Cambridgeshire received a massive infrastructure boost with the announcement of £27m for the Oxford to Cambridgeshire Expressway (£10m of which will specifically explore options within South Cambs); £110 million of funding in East West Rail and a grant of £1.5m to repair our roads and potholes. This kind of investment will deliver further infrastructure improvements similar to the A14 upgrade which is finally underway. The next phase of upgrade works was formally started by Chris Grayling, Secretary of State for Transport last month, quite literally with a shovel! However I am told diggers will be made available to speed the project up! You can find out more about the infrastructure changes taking place in our area on my website

www.heidisouthcambs.co.uk/infrastructure-southcambridgeshire. I met the Secretary of State for Transport again recently, to follow up on the Autumn Statement proposals. I've also been working with Network Rail and local user groups to find a way forwards and funding for the Foxton crossing. I also met with other local MPs and Highways England at the A428 Member's Forum to ensure we keep the dualling project on track. I'll keep my infrastructure web page updated with the latest news on these initiatives. Business was on the agenda when I took part in the Post-Brexit Settlement for Cambs discussion, hosted by PWC. This is the 4th of such meetings I have hosted or

attended and it's an opportunity for Cambridgeshire business leaders to come together to discuss how to nurture investment and innovation for our region in the wake of Brexit. Turning to National legislation, I tabled an amendment to the Neighbourhood Planning Bill requesting the needs of the elderly and disabled be considered at a local planning level when long-term housing plans are drawn up. With our ageing population, I think this issue is so important.

On the back of the work I've been doing as a member of the DWP select committee, I'll be hosting a roundtable in January to discuss the DWP's Green Paper currently out for consultation. After my Disability Confident event in September I was inspired to visit Andy's Kars in Bar Hill. **Andy Kent** runs a small family garage that has trained and mentored over 650 young people with physical and mental health conditions. His team give young people life changing opportunities whilst also providing great service to their customers. Andy should be very proud of the work he has done over the years. I hosted my Initial Teacher Training event in November to find more outstanding teachers for South Cambs. The event was an opportunity for people to find out about routes into teaching within Cambridgeshire be it PGCE, school-centred paid or non-paid or Bachelor of Education. 
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
