EXERCISE FOR PEOPLE OVER 60

- Begin by standing on a comfortable surface with plenty of room at each side.

THE SAGA OF THE MALLARD by Rosalind Lowe

Last year in spring we were visited regularly by a pair of mallard. They landed on our koi pond then waddled over to our goldfish pond. They dabbled there and nibbled greenery. The female often visited the top of our 12foot conifer hedge but we never saw any nesting material in her beak.

We thought nothing more about them as they appeared to disappear. Then early one morning at the beginning of April. John was in the garden and came to say that there were ducklings in our vortex! (This is part of the filtration system for the koi pond.) John had been cleaning it out the day before and had left part of the cover off to complete the work the next day. The ducklings must have fledged that morning and slid into the vortex which was quite near to the conifer hedge. The mother duck waddled about calling to them but eventually cleared off leaving her seven ducklings in the vortex. They could not get out as the sides were too deep. We kept an eye on them for the rest of the day but she never returned.

We were going on holiday the next day so I rang around to see who would take them and look after them. After many phone calls and also many refusals eventually a local vets said they would accept them as they knew someone who would take care of them. So we netted the ducklings and took them in a box to the vets! At least they would be looked after. We went on holiday and thought that was the end of the story but then this year in early April she was back again! At least we assume it was the same duck. She regularly visited the top of our 12foot conifer hedge again. She was alone, no male with her. She arrived from the direction of the ford early morning and seemed to burrow down into the top of the hedge. We thought she must have a nest although we had not seen her bringing in nesting material.

We did not see her arrive or leave the hedge regularly so thought maybe no nest or young just a resting place for her.

However, we did see a magpie who was very interested in the top of the hedge! Then one morning in May, John found one smashed egg, one open with a dead chick in the shell and two other eggs all together near the foot of the conifer hedge. So we assumed she had made a nest and laid eggs which were then predated on by the Magpie. Once again we thought this was the end of the saga...but we were wrong! Early morning on May 18th while having breakfast in our sun lounge we saw a female mallard swimming in our koi pond. Not only that she had a tiny ball of fluff following her everywhere. She had one chick!

We watched as she got out of the pond on all sides making soft quacking noises, I thought she had another chick in the garden and was calling to it. I was wrong, she was trying to encourage her solitary chick to jump out of the pond but he could not follow her as the sides of the pond were too deep.

After watching her for a while we decided to try and help the chick to get out of the pond. Firstly we opened the back gate as we thought maybe we could encourage them to go that way and then down Duxford Road to the ford.

John used some bricks and slates to build a sort of staircase at the shallowest part of the pond. The mallard watched with interest from the opposite side of the pond. When John had finished the little staircase and moved away to join me at the far end of the pond the duck swam over to look at what he had built, closely followed by her chick. She stayed close by the improvised staircase and her chick started to play on it. Preening and falling over back into the pond. He seemed quite at home climbing back and wobbling on the slates. She stayed with him. Then he managed to move from the top tile onto the surrounding rockery and she followed him. They both jumped down onto the path. At this point I got behind them both but kept my distance just ensuring they they went through the back gate and down the drive. They did!

At the bottom of the drive she turned left towards the ford! I followed again at a distance to ensure no car could run over them. She went partly up our next door neighbour's drive but came down again then went further down the road and turned very deliberately into the last drive, her chick was managing to keep up with her even though we thought he had probably only hatched that morning and looked very wobbly on his feet. Once on this last drive she went right to the top by the garage and squeezed through the fence into the adjoining field. Her chick went under the fence and they both went quickly through the long grass in the direction of the river! That was the last I saw of them, I just hope nothing bad happens to her little chick as they had made such an effort to get to the river. So if you see a female mallard with just one little duckling maybe, just maybe they are the ones from our conifer hedge!











I suppose we may see her again next year, who knows.

Hinxton Parish Council has always been forward-looking but even they broke new ground this week by holding the first even PC meeting on Zoom. Formal dress was optional and happily there was no evidence of the PC members having indulged in illicit hair-cuts.

Recent and impending resignations had reduced the council membership to a skeleton crew but a recruitment drive had produced three candidates for the two vacancies arising from the retirement of Graham Fagg and Steve Trudgill. Both have contributed greatly to village life in many ways, with Steve having given 23 years of service and wise counsel in many areas, notably nature and conservation and Graham taking over very ably as chairman following the tragic death of Willy Brown in August 2019. We thank them both sincerely for their efforts, which will be marked in due course in the appropriate way.

As longest-standing PC member, Nicholas Cliffe has been co-opted as chairman and Sarah Robinson and Chris Elliott have also been voted on to the PC as committee members. Thanks are also extended to Mark Flint for offering to stand. We welcome them both and thank them for stepping forward, especially at this difficult time.

With much local activity having ceased, there is little of any controversy to report upon since the last meeting on 9 March but we note the following significant developments:

1. The Smithson-Hill proposal was rejected by the Secretary of State - a resounding success for all those local parishes (and SCDC) who opposed the proposal so resolutely. S-H appear to indicate that they will be back for more but Peter McDonald, our local representative both at SCDC and Cambs County Council, was pretty firm in his conviction that S-H's chance of success are remote.

- 2. The 'NUGC' proposal to concrete over a large part of North Essex as part of the Uttlesford local plan has also been thrown out. The local plan will now have to be redrafted, a process which is likely to take several years and may not as result include 'NUGC' at all.
- 3. **The Wellcome** development also appears to be in abeyance but in conjunction with SCDC the parish council continues to remain in contact with Wellcome and their advisers in an effort to secure better and guaranteed financial reparations for the village. Accounts for the year to 31 March 2020 have been approved in draft form and will now be presented for audit.Emma Senior and Nicholas Cliffe have been closely involved in the village's mobilisation of support during the Covid pandemic and there is a master-list of those residents who are felt to be potentially at risk and/or who may need support. Anyone at all who feels extra support would be welcome is strongly encouraged to contact us. Given the new composition of the PC committee, a list of responsibilities managed to by each councillor will be produced, to be published at the next meeting on 13 July.

In the meanwhile, we hope all our residents, their families and friends continue to stay safe and well and please do remember we are here to support you at ANY time.



Super>fast broadband



Many of you will know that optic fibre broadband reached Hinxton several years ago and, boy, did that make a difference to the internet speeds we could get. However, there are still pockets of our parish that do not have fibre and suffer poor internet connectivity. The Connecting Cambridgeshire program is rolling out superfast broadband to areas that are not covered by commercial providers.

A recent enquiry by our District Councillor, Peter McDonald, identified that 92% of premises in Hinxton currently have access to superfast broadband services (defined as download speeds > 24 mbps) and a further 12 properties will gain access during the current rollout. A quick survey amongst Parish Council members indicates that people living near to the BT cabinet on High Street (where the fibre broadband runs to) can achieve download speeds in the region of 65-70 mbps, and others a little farther away are seeing a good 40-50 mbps. However, getting these types of speed does require a subscription to fibre broadband. Copper cable broadband in the parish delivers speeds less than about 5 mbps!

In addition to extending superfast broadband, Phase 4 of the Connecting Cambridgeshire program plans to introduce Fibre To The Premise (FTTP) technology to some areas, enabling ultrafast broadband with speeds up to 300 mbps or more. At the moment, we (and most of the UK) have Fibre To The Cabinet (FTTC) technology, whereby fibre runs to the BT cabinet in the street and the signal degrades as it runs along copper cable from there to our homes. FTTP would deliver much faster speeds.

If you want to check your broadband speed, try www.speedtest.net.

If you are not getting the broadband speed you think you should, contact your internet service provider and/or check your options at https://www.connectingcambridgeshire.co.uk/superfast-broadband/getting-superfast/.
