HINXTON PLAN: BACKGROUND INFORMATION

Hinxton Parish and its surroundings is under severe pressure for development from external influences*. As a result, Hinxton needs a positive and forward looking plan to say what WE want for our village, be that now next year or in 10 or 20 years time.

In essence, a written document of what the village needs / wants, along with evidence (perhaps in the form of a village consultation), can be used as a tool to start to achieve our ideas, and to have greater impact to influence other relevant parties.

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- a Parish Plan a working document that lists the objectives and actions, or
- ii. a Neighbourhood Plan that has quasi-legal status and feeds into the Government's Local Plan. It is primarily used for housing and development needs, but can also be used to develop a shared vision for our neighbourhood. However, a Neighbourhood Plan gives us access to an additional 10% of funding for any successful community projects (through the CIF, aka Section 106 money). See: https://planninghelp.cpre.org.uk/improve-where-you-live/shape-your-local-area/neighbourhoodplans for more detail.

- Regardless of what the village does (or doesn't do!), the pressure on Hinxton from external developments will continue.
- So we are currently setting up a working group to take our Hinxton plan forward - volunteers welcome! And we will also be asking to draw on the skills and talents of all of Hinxton's residents. With your help, some ideas can be achieved quickly, while others may take longer.
- Take heart, we are a strong community and we must look forward a bright future that protects and conserves all that is good about Hinxton.

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thought it would be interesting to start this little piece for the April edition of Hinxton News with an explanation of why Easter falls on a different date each year. However, my internet search revealed that several pages would be needed to give an adequate explanation and even then uncertainties abound.



The following is a fairly succinct summary (written for children which suits me better than explanations by astronomers).

A council of Christian bishops convened by the Emperor Constantine I in AD 325, made the decision that Easter Day should fall on the first full moon after the Spring Equinox, and that it should always fall on a Sunday to represent the day of Christ's Resurrection. The paschal full moon was chosen as a basis, as this coincides with the date of Passover on the Jewish calendar. As such, Easter is set as the Sunday following Passover. As the paschal full moon can occur on different dates in different time zones, it has been decided by the Church that, for the purposes of scheduling Easter, the Spring Equinox should be fixed to the 14th day of the lunar month.


So now you know!

We in our northern climate are especially blessed that Easter falls in our spring when signs of new life are all around us: green shoots abound, birds are singing, days are lengthening, flowers and blossom in our gardens – all of which gladdens the heart after the chill and greyness of much of our winter. It's the most wonderful illustration of the wonder of new life in Christ which is what Easter is really all about.

The children in Ickleton Sunday School this year are having a craft day on the 2nd April when they will be preparing all kinds of things to illustrate the Easter story which will then, in part, be the focus of our Good Friday service. You may enjoy taking a walk across the fields to Ickleton church and having a look yourself. The church there is open every day.

Things to look forward to here in Hinxton are: the making of the Easter Garden with Julie – all children welcome - at 9.30am on Good Friday in church; and then the 10 am Easter Day service will be conducted by our Archdeacon and followed by the usual Easter Egg hunt.

ROSEMARY'S RAMBLINGS

This month the garden gets a loud wake up call, everywhere shoots coming up, buds opening and lots of cheery flowers. Even if you are time short and you regard yourself as a less -than-keen gardener, you will be well rewarded by each hour you spend in the garden this month.

Now to think about jobs that need doing. April is an excellent time to feed the lawn with a nitrogen fertiliser, try to apply when the ground is moist or if no rain, apply a liquid formulation. Dig out weeds as you go.

Trees, perennials, shrubs and containers will also benefit from a feed of blood, fish and bone. If you have any spring shrubs which have given of their best, such as forsythia, now is the time to give them a prune.

Hardy annuals need to be hardened off in preparation for planting out. Put them in a sheltered spot and keep fleece to hand in case of cold nights. I can't resist a visit to

a nursery to buy summer bedding plugs for growing on, there always seem to be new ideas for our gardens.

If you can find time, perhaps over the Easter break, check garden furniture, fences and trellises for any damage caused by the recent strong winds.

Let's hope that all in Hinxton can manage to find some time to get outside and enjoy the warmth of the spring sunshine.

RENEWAL OF THE PERMISSIVE FOOTPATH LICENCE

A distinctive and much appreciated benefit of living in Hinxton is access to the 'permissive paths' across surrounding land owned by the Wellcome Trust. The legal licence that lies behind this has just been renewed by the Trust with the Hinxton Parish Council for another ten years. For this the Trustees will be paid one pound sterling by the parish. What is special about these permissive paths?

In the hierarchy of public rights of way including roads, bridleways, and footpaths - permissive paths are the most restricted. They permit landowners to allow access across their land without dedicating a right of way. There are three features that distinguish them from normal public footpaths. It must be clearly signed that the path is not

intended to be a normal right of way. The landowner can, after giving due notice, close it off or divert it without any legal process. Most significantly, the landowner can make particular restrictions of their own choice. The notable one in our case is that use is restricted to permanent residents of Hinxton parish and their accompanied invitees. In addition, as it says on the label, motors, bicycles, horses and litter are not permitted. Dogs must be kept on leads, and their mess removed.

The full extent of the permissive paths by the river is set

out in red on our map. An A1301 up to, but not stretch of the path on the west side of the river, passing through a field of set-aside land which is rented by an Ickleton farmer but owned by

additional one is Tichbaulk Road, running from where North End Road meets the joining, the A11. There is a


Clare College. Reflecting this, we have a separate agreement, with both the farmer and the College, also for ten years. An oddity, reflecting a past age when the landowner was more interested in destroying wildlife than in protecting it, is the right to close Titchbaulk Road (with seven days' notice) for the purpose of shooting game birds.

In return for the use of these paths, the Parish Council has accepted a number of responsibilities. These include avoiding damage, not felling or lopping any trees or shrubs, and not disturbing vegetation, wildlife or nesting birds. We must not trespass on adjacent land nor do anything which might permit livestock to escape. A duty to keep the paths free of litter is one stimulus behind the annual village clean-up. A responsibility which is exercising the Parish Council at present is the duty to maintain both the iron footbridge near the watermill and the wooden footbridge on the Ickleton Road. There will be further information in a future Hinxton News about the current closure of the iron bridge (following expert advice) and the remedial measures that will be taken.

he Manor House has stood at the centre of Hinxton since c1452, and is rumoured to be the oldest building in the village.

It was originally build as a guildhall, where public meetings and court sessions were held, but was 'repurposed' in the 16th century as one of two manor houses in the village. It was then that the imposing twin chimney stacks were inserted, along with a winding staircase to the first floor. A small brick built cellar lies under the west end of the house, and was allegedly used as the village jail.

A solar, or ladies' sitting room, was created at the east gable end, and the walls decorated with ornate monochrome patterns, including acanthus and masks. These were later plastered over, and remained unseen until the 1950s, when a young boy by the name of Louis Victory, and his parents, came to live here. The solar became his bedroom, and he told me on a recent visit that he was picking plaster off the crumbling walls one night when, to his amazement, he spotted that there was something unusual underneath.

The remaining plaster was removed by experts, and revealed what the Historic England listing describes as: 'C18th monochrome grey Italian Renaissance designs'. More were revealed in the central room (now the sitting room) and polychrome paintings in the east ground floor (our dining room). After almost 400 years, much of the artwork was gone, but there remain a beautiful unicorn's head and some stylized tulips downstairs, and a large part of the east bedroom decoration is intact.

Louis Victory's father undertook a major restoration of the house, which I understand was almost derelict, and the back garden was in use as a dumping ground, including a car chassis. At that time the garden was open to the fields beyond, and down to the river. There was no running water in the village in the 50s, and the Manor had no bathroom, with only a chemical toilet in an outside lean-to. The house had been split into two dwellings, at some point, and one of our study windows was a doorway until the 20th century renovation. The building was initially awarded Grade 2* listed status in 1969.

Five years later, planning permission was granted for the current kitchen extension. It was, as described by the Historic Buildings Officer 'quite radical for its time'. The flat roof and octagonal design have made it a well known, but far from unanimously loved, feature of the village street. It has been variously described as looking like a bus shelter, or a tourist information centre. The entire building was relisted in 1974.













"Howard and I began our relationship with the Manor in 2011, and it was definitely love at first sight.

Despite the quirky layout, the draughty windows and ugly, fan assisted radiators that struggled to heat the space, we knew we had to buy it. It is slowly emerging into a warm, C21st home.

We are now about to enter the final phase of the remodelling work, by demolishing and replacing the kitchen extension. It will be the end of an era, but we are just one in a long line of owners to leave our mark, and I'm certain there will be many more to follow."

I am aware from the many emails South Cambs officers receive and from Neighbourhood Panel meetings that parking is a constant concern for many residents in villages across South Cambridgeshire. Many of you may know that I cannot prioritise parking patrols over investigating and preventing crime and responding to calls for service. In the light of this, it means that my officers might not do as much parking enforcement as many of you would like.

I have been giving some thought to how we can meet your expectations on parking enforcement and I have decided that we are going to try something new. I have therefore set up an online web-page where you can report concerns about parking. The information that you give us will go directly to me and will help us build a picture of the exact hot-spots for parking issues. I will then use this information on targeted 'crack-down' days. There is some good evidence that crack-downs work in other areas of policing so we are going to try it for parking. For obvious reasons I will not be publicising the dates of the crackdowns in advance, but updates will be sent to you by e-cops, Twitter and Facebook once we have completed a crackdown day. I am not pretending that this will solve all parking problems, however, I do think that it strikes the right balance between dealing with parking concerns and the other important work that we do.

Some of you may have seen recent media reporting regarding our policing of villages. I would like to emphasise that we do prioritise policing of the villages, but what I do ask is that my officers prioritise the 'hottest' areas *within our villages*. This does mean that certain areas in some villages get more attention than those villages with very low crime. I believe this is a sensible approach to policing which most of you would agree with. The main benefit of our local policing structure is that you have your own, dedicated local resources that are responsible for policing South Cambs rather than the City.

I have sought to put as much time and effort as possible over the last three years into crime prevention events in the villages (first Op Oaklands and more recently Op Hunter).

Your local officers and I work hard to give you the best, most intelligent policing service we can but if you have any concerns please do get in touch - or come to our next round of neighbourhood panel meetings where you can join in the discussion.

Notes from the Parish Council Meeting Held on 13th March 2017

Imperial War Museum- Plans and update. Alicia Gurney from the IWM gave a very interesting talk explaining that this was the 100th year anniversary of the airfield. Details and pictures of the talk will be featured separately.

Liaison with Neighbouring Parish Councils- This is going well with all local Parish Councils communicating well and sharing any news. Possible thoughts are that it may be better to support one development plan and hope that this will prevent other plans getting approved. Wellcome Trust may have something more specific in the next 3-4 months.

Genome Campus/Hinxton liaison meeting-Trees on Knights Close- these need looking after better, some need replacing as they have died.

Lime trees on the allotments- going to be re-pollarded, also trees along sides of the allotment to be trimmed. Ancient Lane to be cut.

The small footbridge between the sluice and the Iron bridge is the responsibility of CPPF. There is a plank loose and both Wellcome Trust and CPPF have been notified,

Flint wall- the puddle is still causing a problem, to be added to our road resurfacing proposal.

New Parish Councillor—No one has shown interest as yet - to be re-advertised.

Lordship Farm- The farmhouse is to be sold as it is not thought cost effective to be refurbished before sale.

Smithson Hill- They have now published a link to Questions and Answers from the meeting held in January. They have said that they would like to hold another presentation in May

Iron bridge repairs- There have been 3 contractors approached for quotes, but no quotes as yet. Bidwells have quoted costs of approx. £9000 before any work begins, this was considered very high especially as there is no estimate yet for the cost of the actual work. Willy Brown to see if an estimate could be obtained and if there is any way to negotiate a lower price.

Defibrillators – cost to be looked into, also where it could be kept, needs to be a focal position

Hinxton Parish Plan- we need to make a list of what is wanted in the village, perhaps an article in Hinxton News to see what residents think?

Whittlesford Moto Services -Two Parish Councillors to attend Whittlesford Parish Council meeting

Playground update- the baby swings have been removed as the posts were rotten, the seats are alright, just the frame and chains to be replaced. Cost to replace is approx. £2000 plus VAT. This was agreed upon and the go ahead given.

Permissive Path Agreement- This is now due for signing off and Maps of the paths to be displayed at the Village Hall

Allotments- Now all taken and all paid for.

Surface Dressing of High St- The footpaths and road are in a really bad state of repair, Clerk to write to Highways to ask for a site visit to have these repaired/resurfaced. Each Councillor allocated a section of the roads to report potholes

Rob Smit has tendered a quote to replace some gravel and do some reseeding and he will be asked to carry this out.

District Council Budget 2017-18

The District Council decided its budget and Council Tax requirements at its meeting in late February. By a large majority, with only one councillor voting against, the District Council decided to increase its portion of Council Tax by £5 per year for a Band D property – from just over £130 per year to just over £135 per year for a Band D property. This is a rise of 3.8%.

By way of comparison, a 1% increase in the District Council's portion of council tax raises about £70,000 whereas a 1% increase in the County Council's portion of council tax raises about £2.4 million.

Waste / Recycling collections

The revised waste / recycling collection rounds were introduced on 27 February 2017. There were some teething problems in the first two weeks, for some roads in Pampisford, the southern end of Sawston and some roads in Stapleford and Great Shelford. In each case material not collected on schedule was early the next morning. This was regrettable but these change over problems were sorted out quickly.

We have now had a complete two-week cycle of waste and recycling collections and the system should now have settled down, but if there are any problems, please let me know.

Local Parish Council Chairs

After your last meeting, I contacted the Chair of Hinxton Parish Council to ensure that the Chair of Pampisford PC was invited to informal meetings of chairs of local parish councils so that concerns could be shared and issues of mutual interest discussed.

A1307 Local Liaison Forum (LLF)

I was ratified as Chair of the A1307 Local Liaison Forum at the first meeting of the A1307 Local Liaison Forum which was held in Linton on 20 February. The meeting date was deliberately chosen to be between the publication of agenda papers (expected on 16 or 17 February), and the meetings of the City Deal Joint Assembly (1 March) and the City Deal Executive Board (8 March).

A number of proposals were put forward relating to various parts of the A1307 between Haverhill and Addenbrooke's. The proposals included road safety measures, bus only lanes, an improved cycleway between Babraham and Granta Park, a Park and Ride site near Four Wentways and a revised road layout at the A1307 / Haverhill Road, Stapleford / Gogs Shop junction but nothing linking in the Genome Campus / Sawston / Pampisford area with the A1307.

The clear view of the meeting was for a pause in the process whilst further work was done including talking to all landowners potentially involved, discussions with neighbouring local authorities and internal joined up work, for example in relation to any connections with the Genome Campus area.

The original timescale was for a second public consultation exercise on the preferred options commencing in July 2017.

The City Deal Executive Board (meeting on 8 March) decided that there should be a number of workshops involving the Local Liaison Forum to consider the options set out in the agenda papers and other proposals before a further round of consultations starting in September.

Cycleway through the Babraham Campus

The cycleway between the Gogs roundabout and the roundabout at the northern end of the Babraham Campus was further extended in early February by the opening of a new stretch of cycleway through the Babraham Campus grounds. The City Deal is proposing to construct a cycleway between Babraham and Granta Park with improved access to the bridge over the A11 – one of the ideas that was widely welcomed at the Local Liaison Forum. The only other cycleway that needs to be constructed to link Babraham, Granta Park and the Genome Campus is to complete a link between the A505 and Babraham.

The Hundred Parishes Society

here has been recent mention in the press of police commissioners, funding and crime rates. Within the Hundred Parishes are some interesting examples of early methods of punishment and confinement.

Before the County Police Act of 1839, when local police stations started to be built, temporary detention of villains, especially drunks,



was the responsibility of the parish. Lock ups, also known as cages, were often used and some fine examples still exist in our area. St. George's church in Anstey has a 15th century lychgate. In 1831 the left side was bricked up and a studded door added so the structure could be used as the village lock up. In the 18th century a lock up was incorporated into the ground floor of Thaxted's 15th-century Guildhall. Great Bardfield has a 19th century cage which is open to the public in the summer months. Other lock ups can easily be found in Barley, Buntingford and Great Chishill. Newport has a much larger 18th-century 'house of correction' whose original purpose ceased in Victorian times. A form of punishment which was 'popular' from medieval times was the use of stocks. The purpose of this punishment was to subject the offender to humiliation. Stocks were sited in public places where the 'victims' could be pelted with anything from mud to rotten fruit. Ancient stocks can be seen in Great Amwell churchvard, outside Brent Pelham church and also at Hellman's Cross in Great Canfield. The latter is on the site where Elizabeth Abbot was burnt as a witch in 1683. All the features mentioned are protected as listed buildings and most are pictured on the Hundred

buildings and most are pictured on the Hundred Parishes website www.hundredparishes.org.uk. I hope the website will inspire you to explore our area.

Electronic mail between hospitals and your GP

We thought it might be reassuring to explain how letters and discharge summaries sent from hospitals to your GP are dealt with in what is becoming a paperless society!

We receive the vast majority of clinical letters and discharge summaries from hospitals to your GP via our secure NHSmail account. These letters are then imported directly into our clinical system at least twice daily. Each letter is matched to the appropriate patient and forwarded to either the patient's usual GP or the GP that referred the patient, even if the letter is addressed to another GP. This can be confusing for a patient to be copied in on a letter which is not addressed to their usual GP. However this is because of the way the "Spine" is set up. The Spine is where all the patient demographics eg. NHS Number, address, usual GP, medication and allergies etc. is stored. The reason it might have a different GP name to the one you have been seeing is because the hospitals will use the organisation address of where you are registered and send documents to the Senior Partner. Please be assured your letter or discharge summary will be allocated to the correct GP on receipt. The only occasion it might be sent to a different GP is if your normal GP is away and his/her work being covered by another doctor.

As we use one clinical system across all Granta Medical Practices sites, the processing of the clinical post can and does happen at all sites and all staff are fully trained to deal with all the clinical post in a timely manner.

Electronic referrals - E-Referral

I am sure many of you will have experienced E-Referral or Choose & Book as it was previously known. For those that haven't, the NHS e-Referral Service is a secure appointment booking service. We will make your first outpatient appointment for you in the first available clinic but you can change or cancel your appointments online, by phone or at your GP surgery.

You should make your GP aware of any holiday or dates you are unavailable.

Where to start ...!?

I had the pleasure of meeting the new chief executive of the City Deal, Rachel Stopard. You won't be surprised to hear I shared my concerns with her about the Cambourne to Cambridge busway proposal known as 3/3a, which would cut across green belt north of Coton. We must of course find an effective public transport link, but spending upwards of £140m on a guided busway that cuts through swathes of greenbelt and doesn't even connect with the city centre is sheer madness to me. Local groups are proposing alternative, cheaper options and I will fight hard to ensure they are considered fully before a final decision is made.



Public money is tight and we must spend it wisely. I've also coordinated a number of meetings with stakeholders including Highways England, Abellio Greater Anglia, Govia, Laing, Network Rail, District Council Leader Peter Topping and County Councillors to name but a few!

I want us to bid for some of the Government's Autumn statement money for a number of local improvements. It may be that we can combine funds with those

available in the existing City Deal and our devolution deal due to go live in May.

I'm interested principally in upgrading the A505 from the M11 to the A11 including the bridge at Whittlesford (I haven't forgotten about a cycle path linking Duxford and Whittlesford!) and the well over due Foxton level crossing. I've also held meetings to understand progress on plans for the A428 upgrade and Oxford-Cambridge rail link. Last but by no means least, I have pulled together a programme board to really move things forward with a new train station at Addenbrooke's hospital.

These projects are at various stages of progression, but I will keep my website updated every step of the way. I'd like now to blow the trumpets of our local constabulary! They have recently launched an initiative to tackle parking issues across South Cambridgeshire. They have developed an online form for you to complete to report any parking issues in your area. I

think it's a tremendous community focused idea, so please do have a look here. http://tinyurl.com/SouthCambs-Parking

I cannot believe it is almost a year since we tragically lost Jo Cox, my colleague. On June 17th/18th this year, her legacy charity will be promoting "The Great Get Together" a weekend long event which aims to bring us together to celebrate friendship and community. Some of the UK's biggest organisations will be taking part including the Women's Institute, Oxfam and the Royal British Legion. 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


